

Authors' Biographies

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Mukul G. is currently a Professor at the Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy. Specializing in public sector economics and social security issues in Asia, he has published extensively in international journals, and has authored and edited several books. He has been a consultant to the World Bank, International Monetary Fund, World Health Organization, Asian Development Bank, Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, and other institutions. He has interacted with policymakers as a resource person in several Asian countries such as India, Indonesia, Vietnam, People's Republic of China, and Sri Lanka. He is on the Editorial Board of *International Social Security Review*, a leading journal in the field. He teaches applied public sector economics and economic reasoning for public policy.
- Bajpai, Kanti is the Headmaster of the Doon School, Dehra Dun, India. He is a specialist on India's national security and foreign policy. His most recent books are *Roots of Terrorism* (2002) and *International Relations in India* (2 volumes, 2005).

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Goh, Gillian H.L. is a Postdoctoral Fellow at the Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy. She completed her doctorate at the University of Western Australia in 2001 and later spent some time at the Department of War Studies, King's College London, as a visiting Research Fellow. She has published in the areas of North Korean nuclear security and the ASEAN method of conflict management, and her current research focus is on the scope for potential cooperation between India and China.

Goswami, Omkar is the Chairman of CERG Advisory, which provides corporate consulting and economic advisory services within and outside India. With a doctorate from Oxford, Goswami taught for 18 years in India and abroad. From 1998 to March 2004, he was the Chief Economist of the Confederation of Indian Industry, India's apex industry organization. He has served in several government committees, and has been a regular consultant to the World Bank, IMF, ADB and OECD. He is an independent director of companies such as Infosys Technologies, Dr. Reddy's Laboratories, Infrastructure Development Finance Company and Crompton Greaves. Apart from his regular columns, Goswami has authored three books and over 75 research papers.

Jia Qingguo is a Professor and Associate Dean of the School of International Studies of Peking University. He received his PhD from Cornell University in 1988. He is a member of the Academic Degree Review Board of the State Council of China, Vice President of the China Association for Asia-Pacific Studies, and a board member of the China Association of American Studies and the National Taiwan Studies Association. He is also a member of the editorial board of several international academic journals. He has published extensively on US–China relations, relations between the Chinese mainland and Taiwan, Chinese foreign policy and Chinese politics.

Kelly, David took a PhD in East Asian Studies at Sydney University, later holding a Fulbright Fellowship at the University of Chicago (1984). He worked in the Contemporary China Center, Australian National University, and School of Politics, Australian Defence Force Academy, and lived in Beijing from 2000 to 2004. Among his works are *Chinese Marxism in the Post Mao Era* (1991) and *Asian Freedoms: Journeys of an Idea in the Cultural Contexts of East and Southeast Asia* (1998). He is a member of the editorial board of *Contemporary Chinese Thought*.

MacFarquhar, Roderick is the Leroy B. Williams Professor of History and Political Science, Harvard University, and the once and current Director of the John King Fairbank Center for East Asian Research. His publications include *The Hundred Flowers Campaign and the Chinese Intellectuals*, *The Sino-Soviet Dispute*, *China under Mao; Sino-American Relations, 1949–1971*; *The Secret Speeches of Chairman Mao*; the final two volumes of the *Cambridge History of China* (edited with the late John Fairbank); *The Politics of China: The Eras of Mao and Deng* (2nd Edition) and a trilogy, *The Origins of the Cultural Revolution*. The founding editor of *The China Quarterly*, he has been a fellow at Columbia University, the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars, and the Royal Institute for International Affairs. In previous personae, he has been a journalist, a TV commentator, and a Member of Parliament. His jointly authored book on the Cultural Revolution will be published by Harvard University Press (2006).

Mahbubani, Kishore is the Dean of the Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy, National University of Singapore. Mr Mahbubani was Permanent Secretary at the Foreign Ministry of Singapore from 1993 to 1998. He also served two stints as Singapore Ambassador to the UN, and was President of the UN Security Council in January 2001 and May 2002. He was conferred The Public Administration Medal (Gold) by

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Mehta, Pratap Bhanu is the President of the Center for Policy Research, Delhi. He is also Member Convenor of the Knowledge Commission appointed by the Prime Minister of India. He has previously taught at Harvard and at the Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi. He has published widely in political philosophy, law, intellectual history and politics in India. His most recent books are *The Burden of Democracy* and an edited volume, *India's Public Institutions*. He has also engaged prolifically with public debates in major national and international publications including *The Financial Times*, *Indian Express* and *Telegraph*. He obtained his BA from Oxford and has a PhD in Politics from Princeton.

Mohan, C. Raja is a Professor of South Asian Studies at the Jawaharlal Nehru University and the Strategic Affairs Editor of *The Hindu*, a leading English language daily published from New Delhi, Chennai and eight other cities in India. Earlier he was the Washington Correspondent of the paper. Prior to that he was a Senior Fellow at the Institute for Defense Studies and Analyses in New Delhi. At IDSA, Dr Mohan's work related to arms control and international and regional security issues. He has a Masters degree in Nuclear Physics and a PhD in International Relations from Jawaharlal Nehru University in New Delhi. Dr Mohan served on India's National Security Advisory Board during 1998–2000. He was a Jennings Randolph Peace Fellow at the United States Institute of Peace in Washington DC during 1992–1993. His book *Crossing the Rubicon: The Shaping of India's New Foreign Policy* has been published by Penguin India (April 2003).

- Oi, Jean C. is the William Haas Professor in Chinese Politics and Professor of Political Science at Stanford University. On leave from Stanford during 2005–2006 she is currently the MBA Class of 1962 Visiting Professor of Business Administration at the Harvard Business School. A comparativist specializing on China, her research focuses on questions of political economy and the process of reform in transitional systems. Her current research is on corporate re-structuring and corporate governance in China. Her latest books are *Rural China Takes Off: Institutional Foundations of Economic Reform* (University of California Press), and *Property Rights and Economic Reform in China* (Stanford, 1999), co-edited with Andrew Walder.
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Varshney, Ashutosh is a Professor of Political Science at the University of Michigan, having previously taught at Harvard. His recent works include *Ethnic Conflict and Civic Life: Hindus and Muslims in India* (Yale University Press, 2002) and *Democracy, Development and the Countryside: Urban-Rural Struggles in India* (Cambridge University Press, 1995).

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Xu Xin is the National Security Fellow at the John M. Olin Institute for Strategic Studies at Harvard University and he also holds the post of Associate Professor of International Relations, School of Asia Pacific Studies, Ritsumeikan Asia Pacific University, Japan. His specialty is Chinese foreign policy and East Asian international relations. His current areas of interest include the new Taiwan issue, East Asian security politics, multilateralism and Asian regionalism. He is currently working on a book manuscript entitled "China and East Asia: Reshaping Power and Identity in the Post-Cold War Era."

Zhang Xiaoji is a Senior Research Fellow and Director-General of the Foreign Economic Relations Research Department, Development Research Center (DRC) of the State Council, People's Republic of China. Holding an MA and PhD from the Economics Department, Beijing Normal University, Dr. Zhang joined the DRC in 1984 and has engaged in research on macro-economic policies since then. He held a research appointment at the School of Oriental and African Studies, University of London from 1990 to 1991. He is a standing member of the China Association of International Trade.
